Glossary of Terms from our neighbor's Ismaili faith tradition

JamatKhana - The word means "the house of the community" and is an amalgamation of the Arabic word *jama'a*, which means group or community, and the Persian word *khana*, meaning house. It is commonly associated with the activities of Sufi groups, but has also evolved into the principle space of worship for Shia Ismaili Muslims.

Mukhi - Every Jamatkhana has an appointed guardian who is called a mukhi - a word derived from *mukhiya* means *foremost*. The mukhi is a lay official responsible to officiate over the daily rituals at the Jamatkhana.

The mukhi acts as a representative of the Imam, which for Ismailis is Prince Shāh Karim al-Husayni, otherwise known as his Highness the Aga Khan IV - the spiritual leader of the world's 15 million Shia Ismaili Muslims.

Liakat Damji is the current Mukhi of the Lions' Gate JamatKhana
